➤ **QUALIFICATION AWARDED**

The students who successfully complete the program are awarded the degree of Master of Arts in English Language Teaching.

➤ **LEVEL OF QUALIFICATION**

This is a Second Cycle (MA degree) program.

➤ **SPECIFIC ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS**

Applications for admission to graduate programs are accepted according to the results achieved in the Academic Personnel and Postgraduate Education Entrance Exam (ALES) and the success achieved at the undergraduate and/or graduate level. Excluding non-thesis programs, prospective students are required to have adequate knowledge of the foreign language. Upon the proposal of the Board of the respective Graduate School, the University Senate decides what master's degree and doctoral degree programs can be applied by the graduates of undergraduate or graduate education programs.

The prospective students need to have the following requirements in order to apply to master's degree programs with and without a thesis:

Diploma and Graduation Cumulative Grade Point Average: A prospective student must have a bachelor's degree diploma and his/her undergraduate cumulative grade point average is required to be higher than the cumulative grade point average specified by the respective department.

ALES score: In the line with points required by the program applied, prospective students are required to achieve at least 55 (fifty-five) standard points in the Academic Personnel and Postgraduate Education Entrance Examination (ALES) in order to be eligible to apply for the master's degree programs with thesis. ALES is not required for student admission to non-thesis master's degree programs, and graduate programs offered by Fine Arts, Performing Arts, and Major Arts departments. Besides, excluding students from Turkey, students from other countries and TRNC are not required to take ALES.

Foreign Language Exam: Prospective students, who apply for admission to master's degree programs where the medium of instruction is the Turkish language, are required to achieve at least a score corresponding to "D" in the NEU Foreign Language Proficiency Test (NPT) held by the NEU Rectorate. Prospective students, who apply for master's degree programs where the medium of instruction is the English language, are required to achieve at least a score corresponding to "C" in the same exam. NEU Foreign Language

Proficiency Exam (NPT) is not compulsory for graduate programs without thesis; however, upon the proposal of the Academic Board of the respective Department and approval of the Board of the respective Graduate School, the NEU Foreign Language Proficiency Test may be required for student admission.

Evaluation: The result of the written exam prepared by the respective Department, the result of the interview, ALES score and undergraduate grade point average are evaluated for student admission to the master's degree programs. 50% of the written exam and interview results, 40% of ALES score, and 10% of the undergraduate grade point average are taken into consideration, and those, who achieve at least 55 (fifty-five) points in total, are ranked upon the proposal of the Board of the respective Department and approval of the Board of the respective Graduate School. As a result of this ranking, the reserve candidates are determined according to the scoring order within the available quota. By taking into account the letter of reference submitted by the student with his/her application form, and the composition indicating why he/she wants to receive master's degree education as well as his/her goals, an oral evaluation is realized through an interview.

➤ **QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS AND REGULATIONS**

In order to be considered successful, master's degree students need to achieve at least 70 (seventy) points out of 100 (one hundred) points. In order to graduate in master's programs, the students' cumulative grade point average must be at least 80 (eighty) out of 100 (one hundred) or 3.00 (three) out of 4.00 (four). No make-up exams are held for graduate courses. If a student fails in a course, he/she can take it again within the maximum education period of study, or can take another course with an equivalent credit value, provided that it is not a mandatory course. Students can also repeat the courses they have already passed in order to increase their cumulative grade point average with the decision of the Graduate School Executive Board.

➤ **RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING**

At Near East University, full-time students can be exempted from some courses within the framework of the related by laws. If the content of the course previously taken in another institution is equivalent to the course offered at NEU, then the student can be exempted from this course with the approval of the Department.

➤ **PROFILE OF THE PROGRAM**

The Master of Arts (MA) program in English Language Teaching (ELT) is designed to provide students with the opportunity of acquiring theoretical knowledge with a focus on research in the field. The principal aspiration of the Department of English Language Teaching (DELT) is training teachers and researchers who are well equipped

with universal values, pluralist, analytical and critical in their opinions, self-motivated to investigate and question the matters as well as aiming to construct viable knowledge and putting it into effective use, qualified and skilful in applying the contemporary teaching methods and techniques, and competent in research, English language teaching and on the issues of linguistics. More specifically, we aim:

- (a) to train well qualified teachers of English and researchers who are ready to integrate in the education system and face its requirements and,
- (b) to inspire and lead students towards scientific research in the areas of Education, Linguistics and English Language Teaching (ELT).

Students in the non-thesis program have to complete 10 courses and a small research project over three academic semesters (1.5 years). Each course is worth 3 credits. In order to complete the non-thesis programme, the students need to complete 30 credits (10 courses), plus the Project (non-credit).

The non-thesis MA programme enables students to specialise in one of the following fields of study by offering a variety of elective courses. Students should complete at least 2 courses within their selected field of study to be able to receive their award in one of the following fields: Teaching English as a Foreign Language, Professional Practice, Literature, and Linguistics.

The vision of the department is to give equal importance to teaching and research, be preferred for its specifications and qualifications acknowledged internationally, and stand out as a leading education and research institution in the fields of Education, Linguistics and English Language Teaching (ELT).

• **COURSE & PROGRAM OUTCOMES MATRIX**

The MA in ELT non-thesis program is comprised of three compulsory and seven elective courses. Two of the compulsory courses are taught while the Project is research-based. Some elective courses are also added to the matrix to demonstrate these relationships with regard to elective courses but these may vary based on the electives chosen by each student.

➤ **OCCUPATIONAL PROFILES OF GRADUATES**

Graduates of the MA in ELT program can pursue academic careers at higher education institutions, work in public or private schools at all levels as English language teachers, can be employed as researchers in different fields or can pursue further qualifications to advance their careers in the academic field. Alternatively, Due to their high competence in English language, they may also find job opportunities outside the field of education, such as working as translators or administrators in tourism, public relations, and international businesses.

➤ **ACCESS TO FURTHER STUDIES**

The students graduating from this program may apply to PhD programs.

➤ **PROGRAM STRUCTURE**

In the MA non-thesis programme the Project is a non-credit course. In order for students to complete the non-thesis programme, they need to complete 30 credits (10 courses) together with the Project.

Each taught course including the project is worth 7.5 ECTS. The total ECTS for graduation is 120.

In order to start the project students must complete the required 10 courses with a CGPA of 3.00 out of 4.00.

Additional Notes

A total of 120 ECTS credits of courses are required to graduate. Otherwise, they will not be deemed to fulfil the conditions to graduate from the program.

Important Information about the Elective Courses

The students of MA non-thesis in English Language Teaching must take 8 elective courses to graduate. Each semester, at least 4 electives are offered within the department. However, in order to encourage interdisciplinary studies at MA level, students can also select courses offered by other departments through the Common Courses Coordination Unit (odk.neu.edu.tr). The list of these courses are updated every semester. Students can take a maximum of 2 courses from other departments.

Students following the MA non-thesis program in English Language Teaching must ensure that while selecting a new elective course, it should not be the same, similar or less comprehensive as any course they have previously taken in their curriculum or any compulsory course in their curriculum that they have not taken yet. In this case, the courses they have taken will not be counted as any elective course and will not fulfil any of the competencies in the curriculum.

➤ **EXAM REGULATIONS AND, ASSESSMENT, AND GRADING**

For each course taken at NEU, the student is given one of the letter grades below by the instructor as the semester course grade. Each grade has also its ECTS grade equivalent.

The table below provides the detailed information about the local letter grades, coefficients and ECTS grade equivalents.

In order to be successful in a course, short cycle (associate degree) and first cycle (bachelor's degree) students have to get a grade of at least DD, second cycle (master's degree) students have to get a grade of at least CC, and third cycle (Ph.D.) students have to get a grade of at least CB to pass a course. For courses which are not included in the cumulative GPA, students need to get a grade of S.

Apart from that, each local grade has its equivalent ECTS grade which makes it easier to transfer the grades of mobility periods of students. The chart above shows the ECTS grading system at NEU.

Grade of I (Incomplete), is given to students who are not able to meet all the course requirements at the end of the semester or summer school due to a valid justification accepted by the instructor. Students who receive a letter grade “I” must complete their missing course requirements and receive a letter grade within one week following the date the end of semester grades or summer school grades submitted. However, in the event of special cases, this period can be extended until two weeks before the beginning of registration for the next semester, upon the recommendation of the respective Graduate School department head and the decision of that academic unit’s administrative board. Otherwise, grade of “I” will automatically become grade of FF, or grade of U.

Grade of S (Satisfactory) is given to students who are successful in non-credited courses.

Grade of U (Unsatisfactory) is given to students who are unsuccessful in non-credited courses.

Grade of P (Successful Progress) is given to students, who continue to the courses that are not included in the GPA that has a period exceeding one semester, and regularly performs the academic studies for the respective semester.

Grade of NP (Not Successful Progress) is given to students, who do not regularly perform the academic studies for the respective semester for courses that are not included in the GPA and have a period exceeding one semester.

Grade of EX (Exempt), is given to students who are exempt from some of the courses in the curriculum.

Grade of NI (Not included) is issued to identify the courses taken by the student in the program or programs which are not included in the GPA of the student. This grade is reported in the students’ transcripts with the respective letter grade. Such courses are not counted as the courses in the program that the student is registered to.

Grade of W (Withdrawal) is used for the courses that the student withdraws from in the first ten weeks of the semester following the add/drop period, upon the recommendation of his/ her advisor and the permission of the instructor that teaches the course. A student is not allowed to withdraw from courses during the first two semesters of his/ her associate/undergraduate degree program and from those courses

he/she has to repeat and received grade “W” before, which are not included in the grade average. A student is allowed to withdraw from two courses at the most during his/ her associate degree study, and four courses during his/her undergraduate study upon the recommendation of the advisor and the permission of the instructor that teaches the course. A student has to take the course that he/she withdrew from, the first semester in which it is offered.

Grade “NA” (Never Attended) is issued by the instructor for students who fail to fulfil the attendance and/or requirements of the course and/or who lose their right to take the end of semester exam because they failed to take any of the exams administered throughout the semester. Grade “NA” is not considered in the average calculations.

Both the ECTS grades and the local grades of the students are displayed on the official transcript of the students.

➤ **GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

In order to graduate from the MA non-thesis ELT program, the students are required;

- to succeed in all of the courses listed in the curriculum of the program by getting the grade of at least CC/S.
- to have a Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 3.00 out of 4.00.
- to submit an original project within the given time frame.

This is a full time program.
